10 BASIC RULES TO PRESERVE NATURAL HABITATS

1. Before you start the underwater trail please inform yourself about the dangerous species.
2. Only access the underwater trail by using the two concrete accesses.
3. Always keep half a meter distance with the corals colonies.
4. Fins are forbidden on this visit.
5. Don't rush after the fish.
6. Collection and manipulation of any life form is strictly forbidden.
7. Beware of the eventual fishermen equipments and other non propeled boats that pass through the underwater trail.
8. Plaease repport any person dammaging the corals or the statues.
9. Take as many notes as possible during the trail so that we can answer your questions once you are out of the water.
10. Inform yourself on the Moorea marine management plan (PGEM) and spread your newly aquired knowledge
